BIMBI'S CRICKET VICTORY

The whole of the 11 members of the Quandialla team were tried with the ball in a cricket match against Bimbi on Sunday, and when they proved unsuccessful the umpire was put on, and dismissed the most obstinate batsman. Quandialla scored 114, which was passed by the Gault brothers in the third wicket partnership for Bimbi. It was after the 11 bowlers failed with these two batsmen that the umpire, Mr Dougal, was asked to "have a try". He had O Gault caught for 113 and A Gault made 63. Before giving up Quandialla's fast bowler tried a few underarms as a last resort. Bimbi won the match by 227 runs on the first innings.
