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ANZAC DAY

Anzac Day is probably Australia's most important national occasion. As you know it marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

Even in our small districts of Quandialla, Bimbi, Bland, Morangarell & Bribbaree - war touched many families, and the war memorials that stand today are a testimonial to those local lads.

While tripping through internet space I have come across a few reports of returned soldiers from the First War and I thought they might be of interest to IC readers –

Forbes Times -13^{th} Dec 1918: Air. Lt. Douglas has been most unfortunate in contacting blood poisoning, and at the time of writing he is seeking medical attention at Cootamundra.

Forbes Advocate – 24th Jan 1919: Trooper Norman Carr and Driver W Astor were cordially welcomed home at Bimbi last week.

Forbes Times – 27th June 1919: A public welcome was accorded to Driver Eric Robinson and Private Thomas Causer, in the Bimbi Hall on Friday night last, same being well attended. Speeches were made and the two lads were presented with gold medals on behalf of their Bimbi and district friends.

Forbes Times – 7th Nov 1919: Pte. Percy Sinclair arrived home from the front by Saturday morning's train.

On a lighter note the following is from I.C. - Vol. 2 No. 1 dated 2nd May '57

ANZAC DAY. Your newspaper has already reported the ceremonies held in Quandialla, but I will bet that they failed to report the dramatic entrance made by some of the Quandi Diggers to the function being held at Bribbaree. They have sworn off swinging doors for life. Arriving during one of President Joe Moran's lengthy orations, and not wishing to interrupt same by moving to a seat, they gracefully leaned back on the doors and with a fearful crash found themselves back in the street. Ron Dibbs in his reply to the President made an allusion to the "dramatic entrance of the Quandialla contingent" Messrs Watts, Bailey and Battenally were duly embarrassed.

Today Anzac Day is when we honour all Australian Service Men and Women, past and present.
